Prerequisites/requirements	The student must have attended at least one other history course, having acquired the fundamental notions of the methodology of historical research; know the terminology and the fundamental historical concepts; have deepened particular issues or historiographical trends.

Ī	Teaching methods	The lessons will take place on the basis of the texts indicated and historiographic materials selected by the teacher. On the basis of these materials and resources the fundamental problems concerning contemporary history and, in particular, the history of the twentieth century will be discussed. It is expected also the presence of external teachers for lessons of deepening themes. The course will be divided into lectures, workshop activities and seminars.
	Assessment methods (indicate at least the type written, oral, other)	Verification will be performed by final oral exam. The students, attending or not, are in any case bound to a good knowledge of the general part, which could possibly be replaced by an intermediate written exam. Alternatively, it is expected that part of the exam can be done through papers and reports to present and discuss in the classroom. In that case, the rest of the exam will be agreed with the teacher.
